Course Description: This course is an intensive study and practice of the composition process from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. The curriculum includes the teaching of effective rhetorical modes as well as audience, purpose, arrangement, style, and collateral readings. The instructional focus is on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis.

Prerequisite: Students must be TSI-complete or waived in both writing and reading.

- 6. Use American English, with an emphasis on correct grammar, parallelism, punctuation, spelling, and mechanics, in language appropriate for academic essays.
- 7. Write a minimum of six 500-word essays, including revisions of your own work.

Student Learning Outcomes Assessment: A writing assignment graded by a rubric will be used to determine the extent of improvement that the students have gained during the semester.

Essay Assessment Guidelines:

Essays may earn grades ranging from A to F based on the instructor's grading scale. Depending on the assignment, certain criteria may be weighted more than others, and the instructor's assignment may establish additional, more specific criteria. The quality of each of the criteria determines the letter grade. Not every essay will fit a single grade's description completely. Instructors may also include process assignments and drafts in their assessment of the final grade.

Essays are graded using the South Plains College English Department Rubric. The rubric may be found in the Course Resources tab.

Essay Portfolios Folder: (Turnitin)

The Essay Portfolios folder is located in Blackboard on the Course Content page. The Essay Portfolios folder is a central location where all essay-related assignments and activities are submitted and completed through TURNITIN:

- o Outlines
- o Outline Review Groups
- o Initial Essay Drafts
- o Peer Review Workshops
- o Final Drafts
- 2. Outline Review Groups: these are peer review groups for the essay outlines. Students review other students' outlines and their own, focusing mainly on the thesis, topic sentences, and rephrased thesis.
- 3. Peer Review Workshops: these are comprehensive peer review experiences. Students review other students' initial drafts, rating them on the rubric criteria of unity, support, coherence, and sentence skills.
- 4. Always confirm that an assignment you submitted to TURNITIN was successfully uploaded. Locate your TURNITIN digital receipt by following instructions here: https://help.turnitin.com/feedback-studio/turnitin-website/instructor/making-a-submission/locating-digital-receipts.htm
- 5. After a paper is graded, go back to TURNITIN to review the grading rubric results and read the feedback I gave.

General Guidelines for Written Assignments:

- 1. All major papers should meet the guidelines of the assignment prompt and be properly formatted in MLA 9th edition. You are responsible for understanding and following MLA format and asking questions when needed. Here's a quick overview:
- https://www.scribbr.com/mla/formatting/. Final drafts should be double-spaced, and written in a 12-point, readable font. The title of your essay should be centered; the body of your essay should be left-aligned. Margins should be one inch wide on all sides. A correct heading and running header are required. Points will be deducted for final drafts that do not meet basic formatting standards for a college essay.
- 2. All major assignments should be submitted as Microsoft Word files (.docx). Do not submit PDF, gdoc, .pages, .odt, .rtf, or .txt files. Incorrectly submitted files are counted

late until the appropriate file type is uploaded. Any submission that is blank or corrupt is considered late until properly submitted. Make sure you receive a successful submission confirmation message from TURNITIN. Essays submitted with less than half the required word count earn a zero by default.

Late Work Policy:

- 1. The late policy applies only to major assignments (final essay drafts). Late work is not accepted for any reason on all other assignments,
- such as essay outlines, rough drafts, peer reviews, quizzes, activities, or reflections.
- 2. If you submit a final essay draft after the deadline, 20% is automatically deducted from your essay's grade. Final essay drafts will not be accepted more than 24 hours after the deadline.
- 3. If technical difficulties prevent you from submitting a major assignment, email me and attach the assignment or document the issue including a timestamp. This may help avoid late penalties in the event of technical difficulties, but you're expected to upload the final draft appropriately after technical issues are resolved. I will not grade assignments sent via email.

Student Responsibilities: Students are expected to:

- 1. Be actively involved in Blackboard: be proficient in Blackboard (The SPC learning platform) watch all videos, be aware of deadlines,
- 2. Be responsible for the learning process, including preparation for class, such as reading and homework
- 3. Be responsible for having an appropriate attitude and using appropriate language in academic environments; do not use condescending, inflammatory, threatening, or profane rhetoric, whether verbally or in written form, in academic environments
- 4. Have respectful behavior toward instructor and classmates in order to contribute to the atmosphere necessary for learning
- 5. Be responsible for knowing and understanding your grades
- 6. Submit all assignments in accordance with due dates, formats, and requirements, i.e., PDFs are not allowed, all essays must utilize proper MLA format.
- 7. Avoid all forms of cheating and plagiarism on all assignments, including improper collaboration
- 8. Ask questions when something is unclear. (email, phone or visit my office)

TURNITIN will generate a similarity report for each of your papers and can reveal if parts have been plagiarized.

English Department Plagiarism and Cheating Policy:

There is zero tolerance for academic dishonesty in this course. Do not under any circumstances use words you did not write in an essay or assignment without proper documentation. If you are not sure about proper documentation, you must reach out via email or office hours to ensure academic integrity. Plagiarism will automatically result in an F for the assignment and can result in getting dropped from the course with an F. In addition, an Academic Dishonesty Report may be filed with the Dean of Students.

Plagiarism violations include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1. Using Artificial Intelligence websites or apps to generate, revise, or translate all or part of a paper or other assignment;
- 2. Turning in a paper that has been purchased, borrowed, or downloaded from another writer or from an online site;
- 3. Cutting and pasting together information from books, articles, other papers, or online sites without providing proper documentation;
- 4. Using direct quotations (three or more words) from a source without showing them to be direct quotations and citing them; (research is not allowed in this course)
- 5. Submitting an assignment for this course that you also submitted to another course without my express approval;

Cheating violations include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1. Obtaining an examination by stealing or collusion;
- 2. Discovering the content of an examination before it is given;
- 3. Using an unauthorized source of information (notes, textbook, texting, internet, Quizlet, etc.) during an examination, quiz, or homework assignment;
- 4. Entering an office or building to obtain unfair advantage;
- 5. Taking an examination for another;
- 6. Altering grade records;
- 7. Copying another's work during an examination or on a homework assignment;
- 8. Rewriting another student's work in Peer Reviews so that the writing is no longer the original student's;
- 9. Taking pictures of a test, test answers, or someone else's paper

Academic Integrity: Artificial Intelligence

I have an ethical responsibility to ensure that all students receive credit only for work that they have originally and ethically produced, and the learning outcomes of English 1301 rely on your own original reading, writing, and thinking. Do not use AI tools (such as ChatGPT, Grammarly, Quillbot, Microsoft Editor, Draft Coach, translators, etc.) for any of these prohibited tasks:

- Allowing AI to generate any words, sentences, or written language for an assignment
- Allowing AI to "brainstorm" ideas, thesis statements, research topics, or claims

- Allowing AI to outline, organize, or otherwise direct the composition of your work
- Allowing AI to elevate, spin, enhance, or improve your own words, sentences, or ideas

Using AI to write or heavily revise your writing can lead to severe consequences, including grade penalties, zeroes, Academic Dishonesty reports, and failure or dismissal from class. AI revision

tools can be useful, but in this composition course, the goal is to help YOU learn to write effectively and correctly. The lessons in this course will teach you how to write thoughtful,

clearly-organized paragraphs and essays composed of well-constructed, grammatically correct sentences. If you need help along the way, don't turn to Al. Instead, make frequent

(daily/weekly) use of the free tutoring resources available to SPC students. The Course Resources folder in Blackboard tells how to schedule free sessions with tutors through the SPC Writing Centers (in-person or online) or Tutor.com (online only).
