College Algebra (MATH 1314) Syllabus Fall 2024

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Course Description: In-depth study and applications of polynomial, rational, radical, exponential and logarithmic functions, and systems of equations using matrices. Additional topics such as sequences, series, probability, and conics may be included.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course and receiving a passing grade, the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate and apply knowledge of properties of functions, including domain and range, operations, compositions, and inverses.
- 2. Recognize and apply polynomial, rational, radical, exponential and logarithmic functions and solve related equations.
- 3. Apply graphing techniques.
- 4. Evaluate all roots of higher degree polynomial and rational functions.
- 5. Recognize, solve and apply systems of linear equations using matrices.

Supplies: A 1-inch 3 ring binder OR a folder is recommended for storing graded homework assignments. Students will need a spiral or composition notebook and a pen or pencil to write with. A TI-30X calculator is required for the course. If the student does not have one, a calculator will be assigned from the school.

Homework and Quizzes: Homework will be assigned after each section of notes and will be due three class days after the assigned day. On the due date, there will be a short, 2-4 question quiz accompanying the assignment given at the beginning of class. The quiz + homework will be one assignment grade worth 100 points total (80 points from the homework and 20 points from the quiz).

Late Work: Late assignments will be deducted 10 points per day late, up to three days late. Assignments turned in 4+ days after the due date will result in a 0. Extensions will be given for missed class days and extenuating circumstances.

Exams: There will be an in class exam at the end of each unit of notes completed and a comprehensive final exam at the conclusion of the class in May.

Classroom Expectations: Students are expected to:

- Be prepared to learn (have all supplies ready when class begins)
